SENIOR EXECUTIVE REPORT



Semester 2 is an exciting time at Glenwood High School. Senior students are preparing for their Preliminary and HSC examinations. Junior students have begun a new cycle of assessment and reporting. Our junior students have been involved in subject selection for 2020. Year 8 selecting elective courses, Year 9 with the opportunity to change their study patterns in the 100-hour courses and Year 10 making decisions about Preliminary studies. Students have had many

opportunities to make informed decisions with information nights and guidance from Year Advisors and classroom teachers.

Year 12

Our year 12 students recently completed their Trial HSC Examinations. Staff are working tirelessly to mark and provide valuable feedback to students on their performances. This is an important time for all year 12 students as they balance submissions of HSC practical works and performances. I would like to acknowledge and thank the teachers who delivered workshops during the recent holidays. This post Trial HSC time is essentials for all Year 12 students to continue their focus and dedication as they complete and revise coursework.

Life Ready

Big congratulations to the team behind the Year 11 Life Ready Program and Camp. Ms Morrissey co-ordinated the compulsory 2-day Life Ready course and a team of teachers delivered the workshops. Life Ready is a mandatory program designed to prepare and support senior students as they encounter situations related to health and safety. It focuses on offering opportunities for students to build the knowledge and skills for life post school. Sessions included Safe Travel, Setting up my future, Relationships, Safe Partying, Drugs and Alcohol, Sexuality and Sexual Health. Following the two-day program in school, Ms Cross and Ms Bellia organised a very successful Year 11 Camp at Narrabeen Lakes. Students who were unable to attend camp worked through a study skills program back at school.

VET Workplacement

Year 11 Hospitality classes are currently undertaking the first of their compulsory work placements. Students are working in cafes and restaurants in Parramatta, Rouse Hill and Stanhope Gardens. Work Placement is a valuable opportunity that enables students studying industry-based courses at school to practice and develop their industry competencies in a real work context. Glenwood High School offers the Food and Beverage Stream. Upon successful completion, students receive a Certificate II in Hospitality that is a nationally recognized qualification. 

A story of allowing oneself to be persuaded by misguided advice, resulting in poor decisions, but ultimately leading to forgiveness, second chances and new beginnings. Anne Elliot is a young woman subjected to the pressure of familial and societal pressures. She spends her life pandering to her father and sister, for whom money and social standing are the only things that matter, as they claw to improve their standing on the social ladder of Georgian England, sacrificing her own happiness. Through a series of adventures, Anne learns her true worth and becomes a strong, confident, independent woman, ready to seize the second chance that life presents her with.



As a part of Glenwood High's Futures Learning initiative Yr 9 students worked on a proposal responding to the question "How do we improve the life of one person in Glenwood?" While many great ideas were discussed, it was the Glenwood suburb entrance sign gathered momentum.

Over the past three years five of our Year 12's, Brooke, Daniel, Keely, Taylah and Jayden engaged in an initiative to improve the Glenwood signage that reflects Glenwood in a more positive way. In 2016 the students gained the support of Councillor Leo Kelly, whole heartedly supported the proposal, and was especially impressed with the vision of the students. Mr Kelly secured considerable funding from the Blacktown City Council for the sign to be designed and constructed as a collaboration between Glenwood High School and Blacktown City Council.



The new sign draws on local influences and designs. "We loved the idea of incorporating aspects of the Glenwood community." The two leaves are resonant of the gum leaves of our Glenwood High School emblem and the Glenwood heritage house. Polished metal inscriptions that reflect the lighting of Sunnyholt Road illuminate at night. At day, the letters appear on the edge of a rustic iron leaf that stands on the corner of Sunnyholt Road and Sorrento Drive. "We believe the new sign is a neat, positive reflection of our Glenwood community, which is more noticeable for new-comers and visitors and effectively compares to newer, local suburbs such as The Ponds".



BORROWING	Years 7, 8, 9 and 10 may borrow three fiction and three nonfiction books at a time. Years 11 and 12 may borrow five fiction and five nonfiction. All may borrow audiobooks and cbooks which can be found on the Oliver news page or the wheelers website.
	All books and magazines have a due date of two weeks. If you require your borrowed resources longer, please bring to the Library and renew them prior to the due date. Borrowing is permitted over the school holidays.
NEW BOOKS	We are happy to purchase your suggestions of book and magazine titles for the Library. There is a suggestion box near the security gates, which is checked regularly.
COMPUTERS	The Library computers are used for schoolwork only.
	The TSO in the Library, and Mr Lewis in the Eastern staffroom can help with your computer or internet passwords.
	Printing costs 10c per page for black and white, and 50c per page for colour. New students get a \$2 print balance on enrolment. This amount should be topped up regularly at the office, as you cannot print if there are insufficient funds for the job.
	You can ask the library staff to print for you, when your print balance is too low, however the price will be doubled.
PHOTOCOPYING	Photocopying costs 20c a page. Staff will copy for you.
EXPECTATIONS	You must have something to do and allow other people to do what they came to do without being disturbed.
	If you have group work to do, please use the Connected Classroom, whenever it is available, to minimise noise in the library.
HOMEWORK CEN	TRE operates on Tuesday afternoons from 3.00 – 4.00pm to help students with assignments, homework & missed work. There will be teachers available to help you.
CHESS CLUB	Chess club operates on a Tuesday at lunchtime in the back area of the library.
PREMIER'S READ	ING CHALLENGE [PRC] All students who complete the PRC will receive a certificate from the Premier of New South Wales. Students will be shown how to complete their reading logs online. Glenwood High School also run our own Reading Challenge, please see the Library staff.

Established in 1945, the CBCA was founded at a time when Australian children's books were few, and Australian authors and illustrators were virtually unknown. In 1946 the CBCA established annual book awards to promote Australian children's books of outstanding literary and artistic quality. These awards are now the most influential and highly respected in Australia.

The CBCA Book of the Year Awards Winner and Honour Books will be announced on Friday 16 August and CBCA Book Week commences the following day. Across Australia, the CBCA brings children and books together to celebrate CBCA Book Week.



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

The loss of healthy rites of passage

Rites of Passage have always been a significant part of community life, until now. Each stage of a person's life was marked and celebrated including the significant step of moving into adulthood.

The shift from childhood to adulthood has always been marked by a rite of passage, which represents entry to the adult world and the rights that go with it. This new set of rights is also accompanied by a responsibility to serve and contribute to the community.

The loss of healthy rites of passage

For many young people Schoolies Week, the annual Year 12 endless party, is the only rite of passage they have. The loss of meaningful rites of passage is having disastrous consequences on young people.

Too often we see young men in their twenties and beyond acting like boys in constant need of acknowledgement from their peers, dodging responsibility and still seeking approval from their mother. Many young women are stuck in perpetual adolescence, more worried about how they look than how they can contribute to their communities.

Adults have a role to play

It's the role of adults to recognise and bring out children's strengths and natural gifts so they can contribute fully to their communities as adults. One of the most significant roles of the elderly is to care for and pass on wisdom to the young. Not surprisingly in the past it has been the elders who were responsible for overseeing the Rites of Passage and their timely delivery.

Rites of Passage are not supposed to be done in isolation. As a child becomes a young adult parents also need to take a step and move to the next stage in their lives. Each new stage of development for a child or young person represents a new beginning for parents as well.

Unfortunately, elderhood is not highly coveted or respected in these modern times and there is a global marketing campaign telling us that youth is the desirable and only really acceptable life stage. When adulthood is not fully appreciated or understood, then it's little wonder that many young people are hanging on to their adolescence well into their twenties. Some never make the leap into adulthood.

Families and communities can rediscover the notion of rites of passage and begin to invent their own pathways to adulthood, complete with markers and appropriate recognition. They can put their own celebrations in place that mark significant ages, and the all-important transition to adulthood. These celebrations should include a bringing

together of significant adults and a passing on of wisdom and stories from past generations to a young person. These rites of passage can be creative, must be inclusive and need to be appropriate to each family or community situation.

Refining your parenting style

This combination of nurturance and firmness is known as an authoritative style according to the work of researcher Diane Baumrind who studied parenting styles in Western countries. A purely nurturant style is known as a permissive style, while a singularly firm style is known as authoritarian.

When discussing the authoritative approach, it's easiest to use a dog and cat metaphor. If you have a dog, you'll know it's usually friendly and wants to show love, affection and attention. The 'dog' style of parenting is relational, empathetic and warm. Cats, on the other hand, are different. They are usually self-sufficient and generally able to live quite happily without you. To develop the metaphor, a 'cat' style of parent is more able to set limits, more likely to challenge kids and encourage them to become self-sufficient. They can separate themselves from their kids, step back and not allow emotions to rule decision-making.

Warm cat, firm dog

Which of these two styles do you identify with? If you defer to one, then you may have to work a little harder on more consciously to bring the other to the table. In reality, many parents working in a partnership with each other will share the dog-cat loads, just as they sometimes play good cop, bad cop when they are less than perfect. Sole parents need to be firm cat and nurturant dog all in one package, which is challenging as we tend to default to one style over the other.

Don't mix the two approaches up

Get your cat and dog wrong and you'll be ineffective. If your first approach when a child is anxious is to be distant and unapproachable, then you're not meeting your child's emotional needs. If you meet poor behaviour with a friendly smile or an indecisive manner, then you will not be providing your child with the guidance they require. Get your response right – meet anxiety with dog-like warmth and poor behaviour with cat-like firmness – and you are giving your kids what's required in each situation.

Keep the approaches separate

A common mistake is the failure of adults to separate the two approaches. Imagine your son coming home from school very upset. You are not sure what's wrong, but you keep an eye out just the same. The next minute he hurls an insult at his younger sister, causing her to come to you for support. You remonstrate with your son, then

sympathetically ask what's troubling him. Most likely you'll get a confused response from your son, as you've mixed management – a cat-like behaviour – with counselling – a dog-like trait. It's best to keep the two approaches separate.

In this example, it would be better for you to remonstrate with your son about his behaviour and perhaps send him to his room. Then, when things have calmed down, speak to him quietly about any problems or worries that he may have. This separation will ensure that the firmness of the cat is effective and then gives some time and a different space for the more dog-like approach to work its magic.

The cat-dog framework is a practical way to ensure that your child receives the type of parenting they need to suit different situations.

Compulsory School Attendance

Information for parents

Education for your child is important and regular attendance at school is essential for your child to achieve their educational best and increase their career and life options. NSW public schools work in partnership with parents to encourage and support regular attendance of children and young people. When your child attends school every day, learning becomes easier and your child will build and maintain friendships with other children.

What are my legal responsibilities?

Education in New South Wales is compulsory for all children between the ages of six years and below the minimum school leaving age. The *Education Act 1990* requires that parents ensure their children of compulsory school age are enrolled at, and regularly attend school, or, are registered with the Board of Studies, Teaching and Educational Standards for homeschooling.

Once enrolled, children are required to attend school each day it is open for students.

The importance of arriving on time

Arriving at school and class on time:

- Ensures that students do not miss out on important learning activities scheduled early in the day
- Helps students learn the importance of punctuality and routine
- Give students time to greet their friends before class
- Reduces classroom disruption

Lateness is recorded as a partial absence and must be explained by parents.

What if my child has to be away from school?

On occasion, your child may need to be absent from school. Justified reasons for student absences may include:

- being sick, or having an infectious disease
- having an unavoidable medical appointment
- being required to attend a recognised religious holiday
- exceptional or urgent family circumstance (e.g. attending a funeral)

Following an absence from school you must ensure that within 7 days you provide your child's school with a verbal or written explanation for the absence. However, if the school has not received an explanation from you within 2 days, the school may contact you to discuss the absence.

Principals may decline to accept an explanation that you have provided if they do not believe the absence is in the best interest of your child. In these circumstances your child's absence would be recorded as unjustified. When this happens the principal will discuss their decision with you and the reasons why. Principals may request medical certificates or other documentation when frequent or long term absences are explained as being due to illness. Principals may also seek parental permission to speak with medical specialists to obtain information to collaboratively develop a health care plan to support your child. If the request is denied, the principal can record the absences as unjustified.

Travel

Families are encouraged to travel during school holidays. If travel during school term is necessary, discuss this with your child's school principal. An *Application for Extended Leave* may need to be completed. Absences relating to travel will be marked as leave on the roll and therefore contribute to your child's total absences for the year.

In some circumstances students may be eligible to enrol in distance education for travel periods over 50 school days. This should be discussed with your child's school principal.

My child won't go to school. What should I do?

You should contact the principal as soon as possible to discuss the issue and ask for help. Strategies to help improve attendance may include a referral to the school's learning and support team or linking your child with appropriate support networks. The principal may seek further support from the Home School Liaison Program to develop an Attendance Improvement Plan.

What might happen if my child continues to have unacceptable absences?

It is important to understand that the Department of Education and Communities may be required to take further action where children of compulsory school age have recurring numbers of unexplained or unjustified absences from school.

Some of the following actions may be undertaken:

 Compulsory Schooling Conferences

You may be asked, along with your child, to attend a Compulsory Schooling Conference. The conference will help to identify the supports your child may need to have in place so they attend school regularly. The school, parents and agencies will work together to develop an agreed plan (known as Undertakings) to support your child's attendance at school.

 Application to the Children's Court – Compulsory Schooling Order

If your child's attendance at school remains unsatisfactory the Department

may apply to the Children's Court for a *Compulsory Schooling Order*. The Children's Court magistrate may order a Compulsory Schooling Conference to be convened.

• Prosecution in the Local Court

School and Department staff remain committed to working in partnership with you to address the issues which are preventing your child's full participation at school. In circumstances where a breach of compulsory schooling orders occurs further action may be taken against a parent in the Local Court. The result of court action can be the imposition of a community service order or a fine.

What age can my child leave school?

All New South Wales students must complete Year 10 or its equivalent. After Year 10, and up until they reach 17 years of age, there are a range of flexible options for students to complete their schooling.

Working in Partnership

The Department of Education and Communities recognises that working collaboratively with students and their families is the best way to support the regular attendance of students at school.

We look forward to working in partnership with you to support your child to fulfil their life opportunities. If a student misses as little as 8 days in a school term, by the end of primary school they'll have missed over a year of school.
