Work placement is a mandatory HSC requirement within the Hospitality Curriculum Framework and minimum hours have been assigned to HSC VET courses within the Framework. Work placement is an important component of the course because it allows students to progress towards the achievement of the competencies that are needed for this industry.

### Strategic Improvement Plan (SIP)

As I have already communicated in previous newsletters, last year, as a school and as a community, we started to ask ourselves what we wanted our Glenwood graduates to 'look' like when they left school. After extensive reflection, data analysis and consultation with all stakeholders we are very excited to have finalised our SIP.

We have been able to collate all of the results and have been able to assemble them under three main strategic directions. As a school we decided to keep our strategic directions simple and relatable, while reflecting our core values. The Department has required that all schools across the state will have *Student Attainment and Achievement* as Strategic Direction 1 (SD1). As a school we also believe that we want all of our students to achieve and believe that all students should achieve one year's growth from one year's education. At Glenwood, we will refer to SD1 simply as *Achieve*. Our other Strategic Directions are *Learn* and *Grow*.

Learn received a large input from all stakeholders, but we have been able to consolidate the data and have three main high impact areas that will fit under *this heading*. These are Quality Teaching, Innovative Practice and Student-Centred Learning. The same process was used to establish the main high impact strategies for *Grow*. Grow focuses on student Resilience, Wellbeing and Engagement.

We believe that all three of our strategic directions need each other in order for us to be able to have productive, educated and well-adjusted young adults when they leave Glenwood HS. If our students have great learning experiences they will *Achieve* and will be well adjusted and *Grow*. If they *Achieve*, they will feel great about themselves and continue to *Grow* and *Learn*. All three are interdependent as depicted in the graphic.

This is a very important document that underpins our future directions. I want to thank everyone who has contributed to its development and a very special thank you to Ms Powter, Ms Yeliseev and Ms Levett who led the development of this document.



Each of our Strategic Directions have a number of Teams that will be responsible for driving change within the school. As a school, we have decided that some of our Teams require an avenue for student voice. Therefore, a number of Teams will be calling for student volunteers to be active members. The SRC will be speaking to their year groups and calling for student nominations later in the term.

## ANZAC DAY 2021

On Friday 23rd April Glenwood High School held it's ANZAC Day Ceremony. The ceremony commemorates the sacrifices of the men who landed at Gallipoli during World War One. On the 25th of April 1915, the shores of the Gallipoli Peninsula were descended upon by Australian and New Zealand forces, 16,000 strong. Their objective was to relieve Russian troops fighting the Turkish along the Caucasus Front and to aid the allied naval operations taking place in the Dardanelles Straits. On the same day as the order to land onshore and dig in had been given, 2,000 men had been killed. The campaign would last eight months and see a total of 8,700 men die from wounds or disease before the orders to retreat were finally given. On the first anniversary of the landing, then Acting Prime Minister, George Pearce, titled the day ANZAC Day. Ceremonies were held in every state by the 1920s each 25th of April and continue to do so. ANZAC Day is a day for commemoration for all past and currently serving Australian and New Zealand Army Corps, it is a day to honour the sacrifices paid but also one to monument the courage, perseverance and mateship that these soldiers exemplify. The tradition of ANZAC ceremonies must continue to live on so that we may never forget.

### Hospitality students at the Rural Students' Café

Year 12 VET Hospitality were lucky enough to be selected to complete work placement service periods in the Rural Students' Café at the Easter Show. Glenwood High School students - Aamya, Amy, Jordan, Katrina, Lara, Ryan, Sophie and Victoria worked alongside students from other schools to prepare and serve locally-inspired food.

The students worked hard and gained experience both in the kitchen and front of house. They were commended on the wonderful way they interacted with not only external customers but also students from other schools to facilitate the effective running of a very busy café. It enabled them to use their skills in all areas of the hospitality industry to comfortably prep and serve around 130 plates of food a day and over 200 beverages.

Under the fantastic guidance of Chef Michael in the kitchen area, students took part in activities such as preparation of hot, cold, sweet and savoury foods for the tasting plate that was thoroughly enjoyed by so many customers. They used large industrial food preparation equipment, decorated, presented and plated food items. It allowed them to gain an understanding of the importance of teamwork in the kitchen and the presentation of food so every plate looks identical.

In the front of house area, Manager Robyn's expertise assisted students to improve and display their skills in many areas of service. Students participated in activities such as preparation of service equipment, order taking, greeting customers, service of food and beverages, liaising with the kitchen, clearing tables, use of electronic payment system, money handling and preparation of both hot beverages and mocktails.

The students were excellent representatives of Glenwood High School as they took part in every activity with interest and enthusiasm. It was wonderful to receive plenty of positive feedback regarding the efforts of Glenwood students from staff from other schools, the café managers and external customers. Although these students gave up time in their holidays to work in the cafe, I'm sure they found the experience an extremely rewarding and valuable one that they would happily participate in again if given the chance! Glenwood High School has been given the opportunity to facilitate the Girl Guides program in terms 2 and 3 for Year 7 girls. The girl guides program is Australia's leading organisation for girls and young women in leadership. Girl guides provides non-formal education for girls, giving them the opportunity to participate in experiences that build their confidence and connect them to their identity.

All programs and activities are girl-led empowering the girls to use their voice in choosing their own path, helping them realise their full potential while providing fun, friendships and adventure.

Some key focus areas Girl Guides provides to our Year 7 girls includes team and community mindedness, resilience and confidence in their abilities and interests as well as power to make a difference.

"Our mission is to empower girls and young women to grow into confident, self-respecting, responsible community members.

A group of Year 7 girls have been participating in the program for the past two weeks in school. So far, these students have found Girl Guides to be useful in teambuilding and learning key life skills. In week one students complete a tie dye activity where they produced patterns on a tote bag using purple cabbage dye.



In the second week of Girl Guides students then decorated these tote bags with themes from the sustainable development goals. The purpose of this activity was to build a connection between the global goals and advocacy.

Students learnt that they could advocate for anything they are passionate about and discussed different forms of advocacy. We look forward to all the exciting activities and programs Girl Guides has to offer over the next two terms.

# HSIE Happenings....

**30th April 2006** In Australia rescuers made voice contact with two miners trapped a half mile beneath the earth for nearly a week. Todd Russell (34) and Brant Webb (37) were trapped from April 25 when a small earthquake caused a rock collapse at the Beaconsfield Gold Mine. One of their co-workers was killed in the quake.





**1 May 1994** Ayrton Senna was a Brazilian racing driver who won the Formula One Driver's Championship in 1988, 1990 and 1991. Senna is one of three Formula One drivers from Brazil to win the World Championship and won 41 Grands Prix and 65 pole positions. He died in an accident leading the 1994 San Marino grand Prix driving for the Williams team.

**2 May 1611** The Authorized Version of the Bible (<u>King James</u> <u>Version</u>) was first published, and became the standard English language Bible.





**3 May 1841** New Zealand was declared a British colony.

**4 May 1864**, the first brown trout eggs ever successfully shipped to **Australia** hatched in the cool waters of Plenty River, Tasmania – causing a ripple effect for both fishing and conservation that endures to this **day**.





**5 May 1494** On 2nd voyage to New World Christopher Columbus sights Jamaica, landing at Discovery Bay

**6 May 1937**, On this day in 1937, while landing at Lakehurst, New Jersey, on its first transatlantic crossing of the year, the German <u>dirigible</u> <u>Hindenburg</u> burst into flames and was destroyed, killing 36 of the 97 persons aboard.

## Managing anxiety before it becomes a problem



The president of Australian Primary Principals Association (APPA) recently highlighted the enormity of the anxiety problem that children are facing. A survey of primary schools across Australia conducted by the APPA showed that 80% of school leaders regard anxiety as a significant issue for children.

Research shows that childhood anxiety left unmanaged will almost certainly re emerge, highlighting the importance of early detection and management of anxiety. Parents, as first responders, play an important role by minimising the impact of stress-ful moments before they lead to full-blown anxiety. Here's how they can help.

#### **Recognise anxiety triggers**

Recognising the events that trigger anxiety is the first step in helping a child to manage their stress. Rapid or unpredictable change, new social situations, unfamiliar events and difficult experiences are the most common anxiety stressors for kids.

#### **Know how it shows**

Stress and anxiety show in many ways however most children display anxiety behaviours that are unique to them. Typically, anxiety shows through physical signs such as chest pains, nausea and headaches. Anxiety can be observed through behavioural clues such as avoidance of activities, aggression, concentration difficulties and constant fiddling and movement. Worrying, overthinking and catastrophising are also common in children who experience anxiety. Knowing how anxiety shows in your child will alert you to respond appropriately with support and understanding.

#### Give kids tools to manage their states

Once anxiety is experienced it never truly disappears. It's always there in the background. Anxiety needs managing so kids can get on with their lives rather than become overwhelmed by stress and worry. Providing children with tools to manage their thinking, emotional and physical states prevents anxiety from becoming debilitating. Management tools such as deep breathing, mindfulness and exercise as well as techniques to help kids distance themselves from their anxiety-inducing thoughts help them minimise the impact of stress.

### Help them understand how anxiety works

Children who understand what happens in their brains and bodies when they are stressed are better able to manage their anxious states. Providing children with a thorough knowledge of how anxiety works and how it shows empowers them to push their worries into the background while they get on with their lives. Managing anxiety takes practice, but it's absolutely essential if children are to flourish rather than become overwhelmed by stress and worry.


